- 19. Does the sanctuary use animals in off-site education programs (shopping malls, sporting events, schools, parades, theatrical productions, etc.)?
- 20. Does the sanctuary allow the public to feed the animals?
- 21. Is the sanctuary open to the public? If so, is admission charged, what hours are they open, and are the animals afforded privacy? Does a protective fence adequately separate animals and visitors and are visitors supervised?

#### Veterinary Medical and First Aid

- 22. Are first-aid supplies available to the staff, and is the staff trained in first aid?
- 23. Is a qualified veterinarian available? Indicate the frequency of veterinary visits and the distance the veterinarian is located from the sanctuary.
- 24. Does veterinary care appear adequate?
- 25. Does the sanctuary have appropriate quarantine facilities for newly arrived or sick/injured animals?
- 26. Does the sanctuary utilize M99, M50-50, or other controlled drugs? If yes, are appropriate protocols established for the use of such drugs if a veterinarian is not present, and are the drugs stored in a safe?
- 29. Does the sanctuary normally perform necropsies and maintain appropriate records on the health of the animals?

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#### **Emergency Systems and Security**

30. Is the sanctuary's emergency system adequate in the event an animal or human is injured?

- 31. Are emergency procedures written and is staff adequately trained?
- 32. Describe the perimeter fencing and safety / security measures to prevent both escapes and intruders?
- 33. Is the local fire department aware of the sanctuary and are emergency services readily available?
- 34. Are fire extinguishers and alarms available and maintained in good working order, and is the staff trained in their use?
- 35. Are animal records protected from fire, flood, and other natural hazards?
- 36. Does the security program provide adequate protection, and is protection provided 24 hours each day?
- 37. Is the staff adequately trained in the use of capture equipment and is it readily available to the staff?
- 38. Describe the type of capture equipment available.

#### **Enclosures and Animal Care**

- 39. Are there adequate procedures for servicing enclosures without causing danger to the staff?
- 40. Are enclosures of sufficient size and strength to prevent escapes?
- 41. Are enclosures spacious enough to provide a high quality life for the animals?
- 42. Do the enclosures provide for the well-being of the animals throughout the year? For example, proper shelter from inclement weather, heat, sun exposure, etc.
- 43. Do the animals appear to be in good health? For example, are they active, alert, appear to be well fed, have a shiny coat, an absence of injuries or bite wounds, and are their eyes bright and clear?
- 44. Are animal diets prepared and stored hygienically, and of adequate quantity and quality, and suitable for the species?
- 45. Is the food preparation area adequate and clean? Is refrigeration and freezer space sufficient?
- 46. Are the animal's socio-biological needs being met? Is there an enrichment protocol that is in writing and posted for all staff, and is it implemented on a weekly basis?

- 47. Are enclosures clean, well maintained, and in good repair?
- 48. Are enclosure substrates and "furniture" appropriate for the behavior needs of the animals?
- 49. Do the animals have plenty of stimulus and activity to fill their waking hours?

## **Animal Acquisition and Disposition**

- 50. Is there a responsible attitude and policy in the acquisition and management of new animal rescue cases?
- 51. Did you observe infant or young animals, and was there an explanation given?
- 52. Have any of the sanctuary animals been bought? If so, please explain.

## **Rehabilitation**

- 53. Does the sanctuary provide interim care for rescued animals?
- 54. If the sanctuary is involved in rehabilitation and release, do they have suitable release sites?

## **Miscellaneous**

- 55. Is there an adequate system for gathering and preserving data on sanctuary animals?
